

# UPSIDA logs surge in land allotments

## ‘Employment Ops Also Grew Significantly’

to 798—an impressive 318% increase. Similarly, the land allotted to industries increased from 114 acres to 526 acres during the same period.

Employment opportunities facilitated by UPSIDA also grew significantly. In 2017–18, the initiatives created 11,570 jobs; by 2024–25, that number had jumped to 51,761—a 347% rise. This reflects UPSIDA's pivotal role in empowering the youth and enhancing the state's industrial ecosystem.

**Lucknow:** The Uttar Pradesh State Industrial Development Authority (UPSIDA) recorded an average 300% growth in land allotment in various categories over the past eight years, revealed by state govt data on Thursday.

“Plot allotments surged by approximately 320%, land allotments by 360%, and employment generation by nearly 350%. Simultaneously, UPSIDA's operating revenue more than tripled, underscoring the state's rapid industrial advancement and growing investor confidence,” a govt spokesperson said. In 2017–18, only 191 industrial plots were allotted. By 2024–25, that number soared
